



At the edge of Bandhavgarh's tiger reserve, Brij Sone Bagh sits between Sal forests, tribal villages and a fort that's watched over this land for 2,000 years.



It's not uncommon to hear a tiger call at night. You fall asleep to it and by morning, you're in a safari jeep, tracking the same sound through the forest.







Accommodation

Each villa is built using local stone and mud, shaped by craftsmen from nearby villages. Ranging from 500 to 1000 sq. ft., they come with its own sit-out area and a few even have private pools.



Experiences

You can go on nature walks with the guides, who know the trails better than any map. There are cooking sessions too, led by locals using recipes passed down through generations.

Visit the village to see everyday life. The market, to take something home or try your hand at block printing.



Safari Lodge

The Safar will begin and end here. People gather for tea at dawn or a drink in the evening when they're back. Some come to plan the next trail, others just sit here because the jungle is always visible through the glass.



Dining

Most of what's cooked here is grown nearby. The kitchen serves local dishes made from seasonal produce. Meals aren't rushed. They're served when you want them, wherever you want them, by the pool, in your villa or under a tree.



Pool

The pool sits tucked between the trees, with sunbeds and shade. Where you can hear the call of a tiger in the distance. There's a shallow end for a dip and a round jacuzzi for when you want to do nothing at all.
